NC Public Power communities were once again well represented at the Reliable Public Power Provider (RP₃) awards ceremony during the American Public Power Association's (APPA) Annual Engineering and Operations Technical Conference, which was held in Omaha, Nebraska in March.

Ninety-four of the nation's more than 2,000 public power utilities have earned recognition for providing consumers with the highest degree of reliable and safe electric service. Nine NC public power communities and four associate members received the RP₃ designation this year.

"The RP₃ designation represents a level of service to communities all over the country," said Paul Allen, Chair of APPA's RP₃ Review Panel and Vice President, Engineering at Nashville, TN Electric Service. "These 94 utilities stand out as models of safe and reliable utility operations."

RP₃ recognizes public power utilities that demonstrate proficiency in four key disciplines: reliability, safety, train-

ing and system improvement. Criteria within each category are based on sound business practices and represent a utility-wide commitment to safe and reliable delivery of electricity.

This is the fifth year that the RP₃ designation has been offered.

Statesville City Fair Educates Residents

Statesville's fifth annual City Fair succeeded in reaching local residents with information about how the city works for them. City staff members manned interactive booths and held presentations about the various city departments during the event at the Statesville Civic Center.

Fair attendees had the chance to speak with city leaders about issues in a setting that was more user-friendly than past fairs. According to Assistant City Manager Lynn Smith, this fair had a larger group of attendees than forums the city has held in the past. More than 100 people spent time talking with City Manager Rob Hites about Statesville's future.

According to City Public Affairs Director Nancy Davis, it is the first time that Statesville has used its annual community forum to demonstrate what the city provides to local residents.

"I've thoroughly enjoyed it," said Statesville resident Rose Schotte. "It's been very informative."

Residents had the opportunity to learn about energy-saving tips from employees of the electric utility department, includ-

ing how appliances like hair dryers and heaters affect electric bills, as well as how to read their utility bills.

In addition to discussing energy efficiency, citizens proposed what they wanted to see from the city planning department and also learned about voting wards and how to start a neighborhood watch.

Mayor Costi Kutteh said the event exceeded expectations and that the new format of the fair allows local residents to get involved with their government. "This is a great time to do that," Kutteh said.

Huntersville Suburb Tops Affordability Rankings

Huntersville is the fourth-most affordable suburb in the United States, and the most affordable suburb in North Carolina according to the latest rankings from BusinessWeek magazine.

The national magazine describes Huntersville as "a fast-growing suburb 10 miles from Charlotte...located along Lake Norman, a manmade lake with 520 miles of shoreline. There is an entertainment and shopping center, nature preserve, and

amusement park, and the mountains and beach are a short drive away. Education here is also exceptional: Huntersville Elementary School earned a Blue Ribbon Award in 2008."

BusinessWeek focused on selecting one suburb in each state that is located within 25 miles of the most populated city in the state, has a median family income of \$51,000 to \$120,000, a population of 5,000 to 60,000, and lower-than-average crime rates.

The magazine also considered other factors, including livability (short commutes, low pollution, green space), education (well-educated residents, high test scores), crime (low personal and property crime), economy (high job growth, low unemployment rate, high family income), and affordability (median household income, cost of expenditures).

According to BusinessWeek, 863 communities were evaluated based on a range of metrics developed by community data company Onboard Informatics.

NC Public Power Communities Bring Home Top Safety Honors



Eighty public power communities throughout the country were honored during the American Public Power Association's (APPA) Electric Utility Safety Awards of Excellence for safe operating practices in 2009. The awards were presented at the annual Engineering and

Operations conference held in Omaha in late March.

The Town of Winterville was awarded First Place in Group B, the category for systems with 15,000 to 29,999 worker-hours of exposure.

New River Light and Power of Boone won first place in Group D, which includes systems with 60,000 to 109,999 worker-hours of exposure.

Fayetteville's Public Works Commission earned Second Place in Group F, which covers systems with 250,000 to 999,999 worker-hours of exposure.

"Safety is the top concern when it

comes to working with electricity," said Marc Gerken, Chair of the APPA Board of Directors and President/CEO of American Municipal Power, Inc. in Columbus, Ohio. "These utilities have demonstrated that they are the best of the best when it comes to guaranteeing that safety is always top of mind."

More than 200 utilities entered the annual contest, which reviews three years worth of data prior to considering utilities for an award. Entrants were placed in categories according to their number of worker-hours and judged for the most incident-free records during 2009. The incidence rate used to judge contest entries is based on the number of work-related reportable injuries or illnesses and the number of worker-hours during 2009, as defined by the Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA).

NC Line Workers Triumph in National Rodeo

Two of the nine winning teams in the American Public Power Association's ninth annual Public Power Line Workers' Rodeo hail from NC public power utilities.

Forty teams and 50 apprentices from not-for-profit, community-owned electric utilities nationwide participated in the rodeo, which was held in conjunction with the APPA's Engineering and Operations Technical Conference. The competition is comprised of a series of events that demonstrate the safe work practices that line workers must implement while on the job at their utilities.

There are two levels of competition within the rodeo. Journeyman teams have three members—two climbers and one ground person—with an optional alternative team member. All journeymen competitors must have more than four years of experience within the electric utility trade. Apprentices make up the second level of competition. These line workers

have four years or fewer of experience in the trade.

Events were judged based on safety, work practices, neatness, ability, equipment handling, and timely event completion. All safety rules established by the Occupational Safety and Health Administration and the APPA Safety Manual were observed during the competitive events.

Plant Status

NCMPA1

Catawba Unit 1 is operating at 100 percent power without any major problems.

Catawba Unit 2 is currently operating at 100 percent power in its 355th day of continuous operation.

McGuire Unit 1 began a scheduled 34-day refueling outage on March 13. The unit is projected to return to service by April 16.

McGuire Unit 2 is currently operating at 100 percent power in its 181st day of continuous operation.

Brunswick Unit 1 is currently in a refueling outage.

Brunswick Unit 2 is currently operating at 100 percent power and has provided 60 days of continuous service.

Roxboro Unit 4 is operating normally according to system load requirements.

Load Management Info

In March, NCMPA1 recommended load management for Agency cities for two hours over a one-day period. Electric-Save operations occurred for two hours over a one-day period. For Non-Agency cities, NCMPA1 recommended load management for five hours over a three-day period including the Duke Control Area Peak which occurred on March 2 at hour ending 8 p.m.

In March, NCEMPA provided advance telephone or pager recommendations for residential load management for 11 hours over a four-day period, including the day and hour of the Progress Energy Carolinas (PEC) monthly peak. Electric-Save (direct control) operations occurred for five hours over a four-day period, including the PEC monthly billing peak occurring on March 2 at hour ending 7 p.m.
